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THE COMMANDING OFFICER'S CORNER -

All ranks of the Regiment sincerely regretted the absence of Brigadier A. Hamilton GAULT, DSO, OBE, ED, at the Trooping of the Colour. He was however, very much with us in spirit, as were PATRICIA'S throughout the country. He is now, happily, very much on the mend and is at Mont St Hilaire, although his address will remain care of the GAULT Estate, 437 St James Street West, Montreal.

Training is intensive for the coming summer months, with Support and "D" Company providing demonstration platoons for Wainwright Reserve Army camps. "A" Company handles all new recruits and re-enlistments, and the LEONFORTE and ROATTI recruit squads are showing much promise. Many 1st class recruits are coming in , and our strength is now over 400 all ranks.

The eighty eight Cadets of the Canadian Officers Training Corps, attached for four months to the Battalion, are showing outstanding progress day by day. The scheme of providing and training officers for both the Active and the Reserve Force is proving to be a first class one, with very satisfactory results to date. The Cadets have been rapidly absorbed into all phases of the Regiment's activities, and are deriving maximum benefit from their training.

THE SECOND IN COMMAND REPORTS -

With the end of May fast approaching we say good-bye to what was perhaps the most eventful month of the year for the Regiment. This seems to be a fitting time to extend a note of thanks to the Royal Canadian Air Force for their splendid co-operation and their playing which did much to make the Trooping of the Colour a great success.

The air force band carry with them a bass drum which has become internationally known, since it bears the autographs of many prominent persons, such as Princess Juliana of the Netherlands, General A.G.L. McMAUCHTON, Mayor Fiorello La GUARDIA, and many Victoria Cross winners of the past war. At the request of Band Master Carl FRIBERG, our Commanding Officer's signature was added to the long list of international celebrities.

Needless to say, our own "Drums" did an excellent job, and much credit is due Drum Major J.B. MACFIE, for the commendable showing.

With the break-up of the Currie Area Pen's Canteen, we at last have our own Regimental Canteen again. Both wet and dry Canteens are being repainted and re-decorated. In addition, the dry canteen is being enlarged to include a coffee and snack bar, which should prove to be a very welcome addition.

There remains no doubt that the Trooping of the Colour greatly impressed the Calgarians who were fortunate enough to witness the ceremony. Since the parade, large numbers of Calgarians have told me of how very impressed they were, and of how very smart and soldierly, are the soldiers of the Regiment they see in town.

FROM THE ADJUTANT'S OFFICE -

As in our last Newsletter, the most important item of news for the month concerns the visit to Currie Barracks of a distinguished personage. On Monday the 26th of May, Major General N.E. RODGER, CBE, the Quartermaster General, paid the Calgary area, and in particular Currie Barracks, an orientation visit.

General RODGER, arrived in Currie Barracks at 1030 hrs, and was introduced to the area detachment commanders by Lt col WARE, the senior officer within the area. Immediately after the introductions were completed, the Gereral proceeded on a tour of inspection of billets, both permanent and temporary, and other accomposation facilities in the area. His inspection was completed by noon, and with Major E.W.H. BERWICH, Officer Commanding LdSH (RC), General RODGER proceeded to the Lord STRATHCONA'S HORSE Officer's Mess where he was the guest of Major BERWICH for dinner.

During the afternoon, the itinerary which had been planned for the General, took him away from the Currie Barracks area, but by evening General RODGERS had returned. He was the guest of Colonel WARE in the PATRICIA Officer's Mess for supper, where he had occasion to meet all of the Regimental Company Commanders, and many of the other Officers residing in the mess.

In our March edition of the Newsletter, mention was made of the Regimental parade square, then an appalling mess... well one wouldn't recognize it as being the same square now. During the month, by dint of furious activity, it has become a joy to behold. It is now graded, packed, macadamized, and smoothed, and stands ready to be black-topped. We are told it will be ready for use within a fortnight.

In addition to normal training, the Battalion is providing two demonstration platoons for demo work this summer. The first, commanded by Lieutenant R.H. GRAHAM, is to become the COTC Demonstration Platoon, and will be called upon to do demonstrations of weapon training and tactical handling for the student officers. Sergeant M. BARNETT, will be Platoon sergeant, and Corporals E.P. SHAW, G.J. GOLDSWORTHY, and P.A. LYNCH, are to be the section leaders. The second platoon, commanded by Lieutenant L.W. BASHAM, will be utilized as an Infantry cum tank demo platoon at Wainwright late in the summer. Sergeant A.J.G. DAVIS, is to be platoon sergeant, and Corporals L.P. BERARD, E.S. CHATRY, C. NORRIE, and C.V. NELSON, will do the section leading.

THE RSM's PAGE -

We were immensely pleased to have ex-Regimental Sergeant Major T.J. TURNBULL with us for the Trooping of the Colour. He was able to come to Calgary for a two week stay, during which time he spent many golden hours with the 'new-crop' in the mess. His tales of the early days with the Regiment were a rare treat, and an excellent picture of the corresponding days of reorganization after World War 1. We were all very sorry to see "T.T." leave us for his home in Winnipeg, on the 22nd of May.

For those who have not had the pleasure of knowing "T.T.", I will outline his biography and some of the bright spots in his colorful career.

He enlisted in 1887 as a boy with the ARGYLE and SUTHERLAND HIGHLANDERS, and served with his Regiment during their tour of foreign service in India. This was in the day of high adventure when a mention of that place....India..... brought haunting thoughts of mysterious Indian tortures, and bloody shirmishes in the Lyber pass, to every man's mind. These were the golden days, immortalized by LIPLING.

It was not long before T.J. TURNBULL's bent for music took him into the band where he became a Bandsman and Piper. However, yielding to his yen for action, "T.T." was transferred to a duty Company, and soon rose to non-commissioned rank in the field. In 1900, he had an opportunity to attend famed kneller Hall, but forewent this rare chance in his eagerness to get into action with his Regiment.

He served through the war in South Africa as an NCO at duty, and was wounded in the leg by a Boer bullet whilst crossing the 'Modder River'. His wound meant the end of the war for him and he was transferred back to the United Fingdom. Here he transferred to the SCOTS GUARDS, and subsequently became a Drum Major with that illustrious Regiment.

But greater things were in store for the doughty warrior.....he was posted to the ENNISHILLEN FUSILIERS and was appointed Regimental Sergeant Major of that Regiment.

During the First World War, "T.T." was with his Regiment through the campaigns in France and in Egypt, and remained with the "St INS", until the end of hostilities. However by this time he had served under three monarchs over a period of 31 years....a long time in uniform....and so his career in the Imperial Army drew quickly to it's close. In 1920, T.J. TURNEULL was retired to pension.

THE RSM's PAGE (contd) -

There is an old saying that you can't keep a good man down.....well, never was it more truly spoken than of T.J. TURNBULL. In 1921, RSM T.J. TURNBULL, came to Canada as an Instructor to the Canadian Militia, and subsequently in the same year, was appointed RSM of the PPCLI.

His career in the Canadian Army is a matter of legend. Much of the fine reputation established by the Regiment in "Jestern Canada in the peace years between the wars, is attributable to "T.T.". His vast knowledge of procedures and customs of the service was unparralleled in the "Jest. In fact, even while he was still serving he had become a popular legend in military circles. Members of the Regiment always said that the song, "The Sergeant Majors on Parade ", and particularly the phrases, "Recruits say I bite, NGO's die of fright "....were written of RSM TURNBULL. Yet these references only typify the awe in which he was held and the respect which his bearing and manner commanded, for there was never an RSM more fatherly to recruits off parade, and more friendly and helpful to young NCO's.

He was renowned for his sense of humour and his quick wit. Old timers still tell of the occasion on which the Orderly Sergeant, resplendent with his belt, bayonet, sash, and stick, paraded the CO's orders with his braces hanging below his tunic.

"Just like ruddy "B" Company," said the old man coming on parade, "Roview order upstairs...order down stairs."

August 1934, after a period in uniform totalling 47 continuous years. He has left an indelible mark within the Battalion; at the outbreak of war, every Warrant Officer and NCO of Sergeant or higher rank, had originally been chosen and started upon his carrer by "T.T.". Even to-day, two of those whom he chose are with the Battalion.....RSM O. GARDNER, and CSM G. MILLER. Through them his work carries on.....the work of fashioning a new generation to serve as worthy soldiers of the king.

FREZENBERG DIARY - 1947

At Currie Barracks, Calgary, Alberta -

MAY 47 - A gala Frezenberg Dance was held on Thursday
the 8th of May commencing at 2100hrs, in the Battalion's
modern and spacious Harvey Hall. Although the main Frezenberg celebrations were to be held on Saturday the 10th of May
it was decided to hold the dance on the Thursday to avoid the
inevitable complications of a tightly overlapping program.
The decision was a good one for the dance was a success.

Over 350 were in attendance to dance to the music of Johny BLACHLEY, and to enjoy the intermission keyboard stylings of Pte 3.1. SPIDELL. Luncheon was served at 2300hrs, and after a short intermission, the dance continued until 0100 hrs.

Special guests of the Regiment at the dance were the 35 members of the RCAF Band who had come from Winnipeg to play for the Trooping.

Much of the credit for the success of the dance id due Lt R.H. GRAHAM, and Lt C.S. ROBERTSON, who were in charge of administrative arrangements and interior decoration. Especially praiseworthy was the novel floor lay-out....the hall looked as much like a cabaret as it was possible to have it look.

- 9 MAY 47 The only item of importance appearing in the Regimental diary for Friday, the 9th, is an account of the excellent Frezenberg Dinner held in the Sergeant's Mess. Since one of our tasks is to avoid too great a duplication of reporting, we refer you to the section, "Sergeant's Mess Notes", where an account of the dinner is published.
- 10 MAY 47 The morning of the tenth opened as dismally as, any Trooping Day has ever opened. Rain and dark grey, low scudding clouds driven by a biting north wind, sent all but the most intrepid, shivering indoors. The clouds held no promise of lifting....the prospects of a sunny Trooping were duller than the day.

Still preparations went ahead; it was too late and would inconvenience too many people to cancel the show at this late hour.

Miraculously, at 1130 hrs, the sun found it's way through the overcast for a brief instant....the sky began to appear far less foreboding. By 1230 hrs, large holes were in evidence all through the leaden cloud strata, and a warm spring sun shone down. By 1400 hrs, in the face of the determined north wind, most of the clouds had dispersed, and for the first time of the day it appeared evident that the Trooping would, as everyone so ferverently hoped, be a sunny one.

At 1400 hrs, the Escort and the Guards embussed at Currie Barracks and proceeded to HMC3 Tecumseh, where they debussed at 1415 hrs. Already the Trooping guests and the spectators were assembling to hear a short band concert by the RCAF Band, conducted by Warrant Officer Carl FRIBERG.

At 1450 hrs, Pte H.R. PARSONS, marched onto the parade square to sound 'markers', whereupon the four Guard markers, Sergeant J.C. CCUTTS, Sergeant F.L. MACH, Sergeant D. HOFFMAN, and COMS D.C. SMITH, were marched on and dressed by RSM O GARDNER. At 1455 hrs, the cased Colour and the Guards were marched onto the square. The Colour was taken onto parade by CSM P.J. FORD. CSM F.W. SWIFT, Corporal R.W. BRAIWELL, and Pte D.C. TOUROND, comprised the remainder of the Colour Guard.

over to Captain J.R. ROBERTS, the parade Adjutant, who formed the parade into line left, brought the parade to open order, dressed the rear rank by the left, and ordered the Warrant Officers and NCO's commanding the Guards to the front. The four Warrant Officers, CSL G.H. LEE, CSL G.E. MILLER, CSM J.D. WOOD, DCM, and CSL W. DEMLY, DCM, moved to the saluting base to the tune of "Thunder", played by the Regimental Drums. "Then they had turned inwards and ordered arms, the Drums moved from left to right playing Colonel Moore', whereupon the Officers came onto parade and fell in facing the Guards.

At 1515 hrs, the Adjutent handed the parade to Major W de N WATSON, DSO, MC, the Parade Second in Command. Major WATSON slow marched the Officers and Warrant Officers to their respective guards while the Air Force band played "Land Of Hope And Glory ". The Second in Command then gave the command "Troop". The combined band and Drums moved across the square first in slow time and then in quick time to the music of ". The Colours ", and " Sons Of The Brave ". Immediately after the counter march of the combined band and Drums, the Escort for the Colour, under command of Lieutenant J.L. McCULLOCH, marched to the Colour to the quick-step, "British Granadiers ". RSM O. GARDNER then received the Colour from CSM FORD, and in turn presented it to Lieutemant

J.E. LEFEBVRE, the junior Subaltern.

After the Escort for the Colour had presented arms to the Colour, and sloped arms once more, the Colour was Trooped through the ranks of the Guards who remained rigidly at the present. During this colorful portion of the ceremony the RCAF Band played, "The Garb Of Old Gaul".

Upon completion of the Trooping through the ranks, the parade marched past the saluting base in first slow, and then in quick time, with the Commanding Officer, Lt col C.B. WARE, DSO, taking the salute. Thereafter the Guards were reformed into line and advanced in review order for the General Salute.

The Commanding Officer then addressed the troops on parade, first reading to them the telegram of regret received from our honorary Lieutenant Colonel, Brigadier A. Hamilton GAULT, DSO, OBE, ED, who owing to illness was unable to be with us as he and we had so greatly hoped. He reminded the troops of the glorious self sacrifice of the heroes of Frezenberg, an example which set the pattern for the Regiment for all time and which never is nor ever would be let down. He recalled that May the 8th is also the anniversary of VE Day, and that we do well on this day to commemorate the memory also of the many gallant officers and men, some 400 of them, who laid down their lives in World War 11 for their Regiment and their Country. In ending he said, "On this our Regimental Day we remember all those gallant men of ours who made the supreme sacrifice, and we hallow their memory as an example and a way to duty for all of us and for all Canadians in the years to come."

After Colonel WARE had finished his address and marched off the parade, the Colour and the Troops were marched off to the "Mad Major", played by the Air Force band. Once off parade, the Guards were embussed and transported back to Currie Barracks, where the Commanding Officer. thanked all ranks on parade for their fine showing of the afternoon. Major WATSON, then dismissed the Guards.

Receptions were held in each of the three messes commencing at 1630 hrs. There great success surpassed even our wildest expectations. Approximately 1200 guests were entertained by the Regiment, thus crowning our first Trooping held in Calgary with a wreath of success.

The day ended on a happy note...the weather had not been too unkind...a large number of guests and spectators were on hand to witness the colorful ceremony....and the receptions had been a great success.

Among our guests were many familiar faces.
Both Major General and Mrs A.E. POTTS were able to come from
Ottawa for the ceremony; Colonel and Mrs SHOULDICE were present; Rowan COLEMAN, "Charlie" LEIGHTON, and Major W.G.
GIBSON, were also able to attend. From Winnipeg came Major
J.E. LEACH, Captain R.O. PORTER, CSM R. DUNN, and Sergeant
D. COYNE. Major Meredith J. EGAN, Captain W.H.J. STUTT,
Captain G.G. BROWN, and Lieutenant D.I. MacQUARRIE, came
from Edmonton for the ceremony. Captain A.M. NILLS, who is
employed as Staff Captain "A" at Rear Headquarters Western
Command, was present; as were Terrence P. McCONVEY, now of
Saskatoon, and Captain Captain R.W. FOTTS, now stationed with
the RCSME in Chilliwack, British Columbia. Major A.H.
FRASER, DSO, who was in Currie Barracks for the first two
weeks of the month, was present at all parades and receptions.

RSM T.J. TURNBULL, as in the past, was on hand to view the proceedings with an experienced eye. RQMS HAMPTON, and CSM WOODBURN, as well as Pte BRADLEY, were also able to be present at the Regimental festivities.

Two original PATRICIA'S, former Sergeent J.
JACI SON, and former Lance Corporal R. APPLETON, whose Regtl
numbers were 299 and 1244 respectively, were on hand to
view the parade. Both Sergeant JACI SON, and Lance Corporal
APPLETON, are residing in Calgary, and both were over-joyed
to see their 'Old' Regiment perform the colorful ceremony.

11 MAY 47 - On Sunday the 11th of May, the Regiment held it's annual Church Parade. Unlike Saturday, the weather on Sunday left little to be desired....a perfect day.

The parade was formed up within Currie Barracks and embussed by 1005 hrs. The convoy moved off at 1010 hrs, and ten minutes later was at the debussing area, five city blocks from Christ Church. Immediately after debussing, the parade was formed up on the roadway leading to the Church, Guards were reported present, and the Officers fallen in with their Guards. From the debussing point, the parade moved behind the Drums to Christ Church, where all ranks filed in and were seated.

Present with the Troops were Major General and Mrs. POTTS.

The service was a Frezenberg one, most capably delivered by the Reverand H.H. CRUMP, rector of Christ Church. The Commanding Officer read the lesson from the Book of St. MATTHEN, Chapter 5, Verses 1 to 13.

After the service, the parade was once more formed up and was marched past the saluting base. The Commanding Officer took the salute. From the base the parade moved to the assembly area where embussing was completed immediately. Once back in barracks, the troops were broken off to the "wet" canteen where beer was awaiting them.

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At Edmonton, Alberta. -

FREZENBERG Day was hailed in the best tradition at Edmonton. A good turnout of PATRICIA'S from both wars were on hand to pay tribute to those who fell at Bellewaerde on the 8th of May 1915, and to join in the traditional celebrations of the undying glory won by the "originals" on that day.

Prior to the banquet, at 1800 hrs, members of the Association were paraded to the cenotaph by the Parade Marshal, Sam CAMPBELL. Once here, Association President, Andy McCULLOCH deposited a wreath to the memory of those who fell, while the Pipers sounded the lament. The memory of Bellowaerde was foremost in the minds of all, and clearest in the minds of those "originals" present, eight of whom were at Bellowaerde on that fateful day.

At 1845 hrs the PATRICIA'S were piped into the banquet hall of the Macdonald Hotel, by Pipe Major Henry LAING and Piper Alex THOMPSON, and the festivities were begun. Foremost on the program was the tribute to fallen Comrades, after which Bob MUIR was called upon to say Grace. Andy McCUILOCH then proposed the toast to His Majesty The FING. A toast to the Regiment was proposed by Fred PURFIS immediately before the introduction of the guest Speaker, Colonel E.B. WILSON, OEE, ED, IC, by Lou SCOTT.

Colonel WILSON, a former Commanding Officer of The LOYAL EDMONTON REGINERT (formerly 49th Battalion) who together with his Regiment served beside the PFCLI in the 2nd Infantry Brigade during the past war, spoke highly of the Regiment. He remarked that the Pattle of Frezenberg was the turning point in developing the PATRICIA'S into the crack Regiment they were in two wars.

After Colonel WILSON's address, the hall rang to the tunes of many familiar Regimental ballads, including the renouned, "Ric-a-Dam-Doo". Memories and tales of former days with the Regiment flowed freely.

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At Toronto, Ontario. -

This being the 28th anniversary banquet held 30 years after the epic struggles at Vimy and Passchendaele, many of the originals as well as veterans of World War 11 were on hand for the festivities.

The banquet was held in the 48th Highlanders Memorial Hall at 519 Church Street, commencing at 1830 hrs. Chiof speaker of the evening was Major General Chris VOLES, CB, CBE, DSO, who commanded the PATRICIA'S from the 9th of October 1941 until 16th of November 1941 during the critical days of waiting in England. General VOIES captivated the ex-FP's with his ready humour and his quick wit, which became so Well known throughout the Canadian Army during World War 11. He spoke of his brief tour of Command with the Battalion and of his many and varied experiences during his eventful and clorful career.

a.G. VIETS, an original blinded in the last war and Norman a. FEYS, spoke of the signifigance of the Rattle of Bellewaerde, and of the many happy acquaintances made with the Imperial Battalions whilst the Regiment was with the 80th Brigade.

Two distinguished Padres, Lt col Sidney A. LAMBERT, OBE, who always makes it a point to attend the annual dinner, and Dean RILEY, rector of St. James Anglican Cathedral, were on hand for the evenings fun. They together

with the others present chuckled at the recitations of Jack MacLARIN, and at the excellent program of entertainment off-ered during the evening.

By unanimous vote it was decided to send a special Mother's Day greeting to Jenny McGregor MORRIS, our beloved London Mother of two wars. The greeting was handed by Association President B.C. STONE, to the waiting messenger who was to speed the message to London.

The evening was a marvelous success, with happy reminiscences, nostalgic memories, and well worn stories of the days with the PP's over there.

The annual Church parade was held on the following day, Sunday the 11th of May, at St James Anglican Cathedral, Dean RILEY, officiating. A good turnout of the Old Gang were on hand to pay homage to the memory of those Comrades who fell on May the 8th.

IF YOU ARE HOLDING A PARADE, AS I EXPECT YOU WILL BE, OR A SERVICE, OR AT LEAST A DINNER TO COMMEMORATE OUR GLORIOUS REGIMENT'S 8th OF MAY; I WOULD LIKE YOU TO GIVE MY EVER-LASTING LOVE TO THE LADDIES, MANY OF WHOM ARE UNKNOWN TO ME PERSONALLY, BUT WHO SHOULD THEY FOR ANY REASON WHATEVER BE WITHIN SPEAKING DISTANCE OR CALLING DISTANCE, WOULD BE VERY WELCOME....FIRST AS PATRICIA'S, AND AFTERWARD I HOPE AS PERSONAL FRIENDS. May has been a month of great success for the Regimental Fastball team entered in the Calgary Intermediate "A" Fastball League. To date the team has met five of the opposing teams in six games and has gone undefeated.

THE REGILENTAL RIFLE TEAM -

The Regimental Rifle Team has been active during May. On Saturday the 24th, five members of the team participated in the Calgary Carrison Rifle Association shoot at Camp Sarcee, and without exception each managed to place in the prize money. They were both in Christie Street Hospital, and I have a picture of Charlie shaking hands with the king in 1939.... he was proud to tell how he had been decorated by and had spoken to Queen VICTORIA, and then to have his photograph taken as he shoot hands with Her Great Grandson.

.... On Saturday the big "do" in Toronto, and on Sunday the Church parade....and in about a months time I shall be getting a menu signed by my beloved Laddies, and another souvenier will be added to my collection.

.... I'y love to everybody

- Once again we say many thanks to Fraser M. GERRIE, who sent us a menu and a clipping covering Edmonton PATRICIA Associations' Frezenberg Dinner.
- And to Eric W. HARRIS, Secretary of the Toronto PATRICIA Association, we also extend our thanks for his thoughtfulness in sending us the May the 8th notice, a clipping, and his personal account of the activities in Toronto on Frezenberg Day,
- During May we also had a letter from former Lieutenant J.V.
 "Vic" SPURR, who was Intelligence Officer with the Battalion
 for many months during the past war. Vic, whose home is in
 Calgary, has written to say....
 - "....Cocasionally I meet Ex-PATRICIA'S, such as Lieutenants RICHARDS, and GARBUTT, who are both attending the University of Alberta, and Lieutenant McCLELLAND, employed here in Calgary also Lieutenant Don MUNROE, who is farming north of here, at Airdrie, I believe."

- Also, on the 9th of May, the Commanding Officer received a letter from Mr Charles LORD, Fisheries Inspector in British Columbia, whose son, Lance Sergeant Charles Grainger LORD, was one of those who fell during the epic storming of the Hitler Line on the 23rd of May 1944. Unfortunately, due to unavoidable circumstances, Mr. LORD was unable to be present at the Trooping of the Colour this year, and wrote to tender his regrets.
- On the 29th of May, a wedding of unusual interest to PATRICIA'S took place in Calgary, Alberta. Mr G.A. GARBUTT, and Miss Betty ALLAN were wed in the home of the Groom's parents. The bride is a sister of Lieutenant V.S. ALLAN, who was killed whilst serving with the Battalion on the 15th of December 1944.

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REGIMENTAL HISTORY, Part 8 -

" FIRST ACTIONS WITH THE 7th BRIGADE "

- 26 NOV 15 PATRICIA'S spend a short period in Fletre, near
 to
 Bailleul, where the Regiment is augumented by the
 3rd University Company. This reinforcement brought
 the Battalion's fighting strength to 1040 all ranks.
 - 7 DEC 15 It col H.C. BULLER, DSO, resumes command.
- 22 DEC 15 The PATRICIA'S are temporarily designated Corps troops, and are placed under command of Maj Gen M.S. MERCER, CB. The PFCLI, together with the RCR, the 42nd Battalion, and the 49th Battalion, were united to form the 7th Canadian Infantry Brigade; thus forming the first complete Frigade of the proposed 3rd Canadian Division.
- 25 DEC 15 PATRICIA'S spend Christmas day in La Cytte, strengthening the defences of Mount Femmel on the southern tip of the Ypres salient.
 - 1 JAN 16 Regiment is billetted at Fletre.
 - 8 JAN 16
- 9 JAN 16 The 7th Brigade moves into the line to relieve the 1st Canadian Infantry Brigade. PATRICIA'S are the Brigade reserve at Dranoutre.
- 12 JAN 16 PATRICIA'S move into the front line in the soggy
 to
 "Tytschaete sector, and alternate between forward and
 reserve throughout tour.
- 7 FEP 16 . PATRICIA'S occupy the line 3000 yards immediately in front of lemmel. With the exception of a minor counter-sniper scrap on the 27th of Feb, the tour is uneventful.
- 28 FEP 16 Pattalion returns to reserve position.
 - 1 MAR 16 PATRICIA'S complete another tour in the Femmel trenchto es, after which they are called upon to furnish in-7 MAR 16 structors for the newly formed 9th Infantry Brigade.
 - 8 MAR 16 Battalion in reserve for rest and training till 20th.

20 MAR 16 - PATRICIA'S move into Poperinghe in the Ypres Sector.

The battle line of the 3rd Canadian Divisiin was very critically placed at an obviously suitable point for the enemy to attack as soon as weather conditions became favourable. Hooge, Sanctuary Wood, and Mount Sorrel had always to be held in force. It was to this critical sector that the 7th Brigade was despatched.

The whole of this front line, and more particularly the Sanctuary Wood sector was commanded by the German position. The two opposing trench systems were very close, and the enemy had a strong point of great advantage in the 'bird-cage', a fort in the grounds of Stirling Castle, from which he could enfilade the greater part of the entire front. It was early recognized, and by none more clearly than by Colonel BULLER, that if the Germans made a determined effort to reach Mount Sorrel and Observatory Ridge, this front line could easily be blown out of existence. The defensive system for Sanctuary Wood was therefore, entirely dependent upon a rear supporting line. (named the "R" line.)

Broadly speaking, the Canadian front although garrisoned as a front line, was in many places only an outpost line, and could easily be rendered untenable by enemy artillery fire. Further the line was so positioned that even a local success on either flank would be a serious set back to the defending force; and lastly, there was no rear line area in which to depooy troops or in which to conduct a strong secondary defence, in event of an enemy break through. In short, the position was very unhealthy.

- 21 MAR 16 The 7th Brigade moves into the Hooge- Sanctuary Wood sector. The Patricia's relieve the 3 rd Battalion RIFLE BRIGADE, in Brigade reserve at Zillebeke (immediately behind Sanctuary Wood). Two Companies are sent forward to garrison a small copse on the Battalion front.
- 24 MAR 16 PATRICIA'S move into Sanctuary Wood relieving the 49th Battalion.
- 24 MAR 16 A tour of trench occupation during which time the
 to Regiment comes under sporadic shelling and constant
 sniping fire.
- 29 MAR 16 PATRICIA'S move back into Poperinghe for a 7 day rest period.

- 5 APR 16 PATRICIA'S move up to line as Brigade reserve. Much to time is spent in reserve line trench construction. 12 APR 16
- 13 APR 16 PATRICIA'S move into front line on the Hooge sector, relieving the 49th Battalion. A very unpleasant 8 day tour in this sector greatly increased the Regiment's casualty list. Sniping was deadly, and the night firing, machine guns made movement at night very risly. Upon completion of the tour, on the 8th day the exhausted Battalion was relieved by the 60th Canadian Infantry Battalion.
- 21 APR 16 PATRICIA'S retire to Poperinghe for a well earned rest.
- 29 APR 16 A night move takes the Regiment to the railway dugto outs behind Sanctuary Wood, where they remain in 6 MAY 16 Brigade reserve.
- 7 MAY 16 PATRICIA'S spend a week of grim defence in the front line. The German artillery was by this time precisely ranged on the front line trench system, and on the rear areas upon which they maintained a steady fire. The Germans' object was obviously to destroy the Hooge and Sanctuary Wood defences, and to prevent any large movements of men or material to their front. Though the Regiment suffered only 33 casualties during the week, as compared with the 60 suffered in the Hooge sector....the incessant pounding of the German guns had severely taxed physical endurance.
- 15 MAY 16 PATRICIA'S withdraw to Poperinghe for rest.
- 23 MAY 16 PATRICIL'S move into Brigade reserve.
- 30 MAY 16 The Regiment moves into the line in the Sanctuary
 Wood sector, opposite the 121st Wurttembergers, who
 had for the past fortnight been specially trained
 in shock tactics for the forthcoming assault.
