Major-General H.C. Pitts MC, CD

Military Service: Major-General Pitts entered Royal Roads Military College in 1948. Commissioned into Lord Strathcona's Horse (Royal Canadian) in 1952 upon graduation from the Royal Military College, Kingston he saw service in Korea starting in July 1952. During that conflict he served as a platoon commander with the First and Third Battalions, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. While serving with the Third Battalion he was awarded the Military Cross for gallantry and returned to Canada just prior to the cease fire in July 1953.

From 1953 to 1954 Major-General Pitts studied at McMaster University in Hamilton, Ontario. Upon return to regimental duty he served with the First Battalion, Queen's Own Rifles of Canada in Calgary. From 1957 to 1959 he served as a staff officer with the 4th Canadian Infantry Brigade Group in Soest West Germany. In 1960 he attended the British Army Staff College at Camberly. Upon graduation he was posted to Army Headquarters in Ottawa where he served for two years as Aide de Camp to the Chief of the General Staff. Upon promotion to Major her served from 1962 to 1964 as a Company Commander with the Second Battalion, Queen's Own Rifles of Canada whereupon he was again posted back to 4th Canadian Infantry Brigade Group and served for two years as the Brigade Major.

In 1967 Major-General Pitts was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant-Colonel and given command of the First Battalion, Queen's Own Rifles of Canada in Victoria, B.C. Upon relinquishment of Command in 1969 he was posted as an exchange instructor at the U.S. Army command and General Staff College at Fort Leavenworth, Kansas. Upon completion of his instructional tour in the U.S.A. he was posted to the National Defence College in Kingston, Ontario.

In 1971 Major-General Pitts was promoted Colonel and posted to Edmonton to Command the Canadian Airborne Regiment for two years. From 1973 to 1975 he served at NDHQ as a Brigadier-General in the capacity of Director General of Land Operations. In 1976 he was promoted to Major-General as Chief of Land Operations. Following French Language training he served his final appointment of regular service as the Director General Bilingualism and Biculturalism.

Awards and Decorations. Military Cross and Canadian Forces Decoration. The Silver Wolf for Exceptional and Distinguished Service to Scouting; and, The Golden Heart Award for Community Volunteer Service.

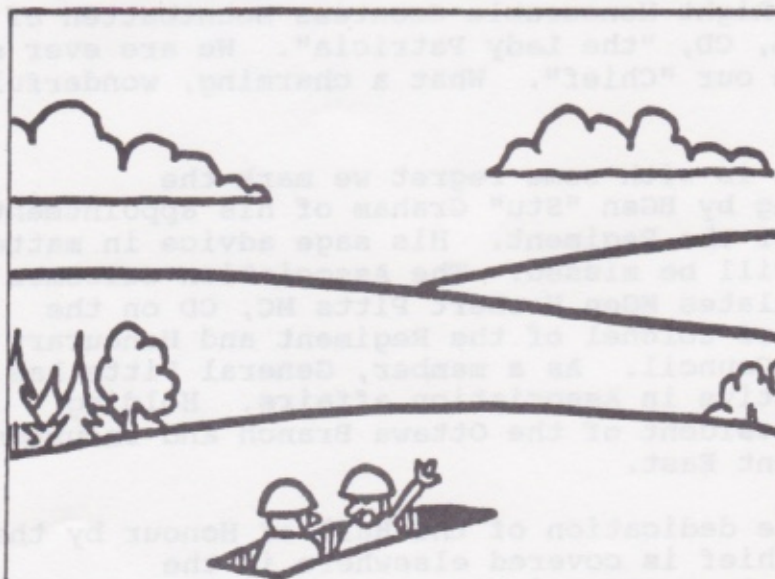

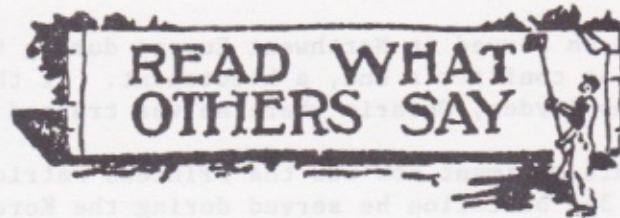

## Funeral services held for Col. L.W. Basham

He was a soldier who, according to his son Peter, didn't talk about his experiences in the Korean and Second World Wars, but until his sudden death September 1990, Col. Leslie W. Basham had made the army his life.

The Richmond man, known affectionately as Bash, was given full military honours during funeral services 15 Sept 90, which didn't so much say good-bye as celebrate the life of a career officer of the Princess Patricia's Light Infantry Regiment.

Arthur Kemsley had known Bash since 1946, and used words like loyal, helpful, and patriotic to describe his contemporary.

"Everything he did he did well," said Kemsley. "He was a soldier in the best sense of the word and a fine man. He was my friend."

He joined the army in 1942 following an earlier, unsuccessful attempt to enlist while underage. He was in artillery as a gunner until transferring to infantry in 1944 where he remained until his retirement in 1977.

Bash served in Northwest Europe during the Second World War, and left, at conflict's end, a Lieutenant. At this point he found himself in Camp Borden, Ontario where he was trained as a transport officer.

His regiment now was the Princess Patricia's Light Infantry in whose 3rd battalion he served during the Korean Conflict from October 1952 to November 1953. His wife Muriel was pregnant when he left his home to fight with the U.N. multi-national force, and he didn't see his baby until it was 11 months old.

In 1954, Bash attended a Senior Staff Course in Ottawa which trained all potential senior officers in brigade command. He was a perfect candidate, having already been a company commander in Korea, and was noted for his excellent drill plans. The year long course was considered one of the milestones in any peacetime army career.

He was a Major when he served under NATO in Germany from 1964 to 1965, and then went to England where he attended a second officer's course as a Lt. Colonel.

As a full Colonel, Bash had the distinct honour of serving as Director of Infantry, Director of Land Operations in Ottawa, and as Headquarters Chief at Militia Area Pacific.

Born in England, Bash is also credited with playing an important part in the development of cadet camps in Banff and Grouse Mountain. He was a cartoonist whose wartime sketches are slated for display in Alberta regiment museums, and he was an accomplished musician who played both bugle and trumpet.

In his retirement life, he took on the role of land assessor, operating his own business out of White Rock, B.C. until about five years ago.

Services for Bash were held at St. Albans Church four days after his death, and were attended by many including his wife of 43 years, and four children.

## REPORT TO THE MEMBERS - MEMORIAL HALL OF HONOUR PROJECT

### GENERAL

1. On Saturday 20 October 1990, the Patron of the PPCLI Association, the Right Honourable, The Countess Mountbatten of Burma, CD, JP, DL officially dedicated the Memorial Hall of Honour. Details of the dedication service are reported on elsewhere in this newsletter.

2. The support of Branches and individual members of the Association, as well as the Regiment, has been most encouraging to date. There remains however, a substantial amount of money to be raised by the Association to fulfill our 75th Anniversary commitment.

### FUND RAISING

3. Funding for the project continues with some Branches of the Association still in the process of raising money to meet their pledges. Annex A attached outlines the status of fund raising as of 1 November 1990. Significant contributions were made by all three battalions of the Regiment and the PPCLI Battle School who have all now sponsored a memorial panel at a cost of \$2,500.00 each. Donations are still being accepted to the Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund to cover project costs.

### PROJECT COSTS

4. In order to have the Hall of Honour completed by 20 October 1990 for dedication, RHQ authorized the expenditure of the necessary funds from the Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund. It was understood previously that the cost of the installation of the Roll of Honour panels, the construction of the Queen's and Regimental Colour cases and the display cabinet for the Ric-a-Dam-Doo and other artifacts would be borne by the Calgary Military Museum Society. Since the CMMS was not in a financial position to complete the work the task was undertaken through the overall prime contractor for the museum, PCL/Maxam, and the work was completed. The original estimate for the work to complete the project was just under \$37,000.00. The final bill has not yet been received as of this writing but will be subject to negotiation for work that was not required but which had been included in the estimates.

### BRANCH CONTRIBUTIONS

5. The following Branches have each sponsored a Roll of Honour Panel at a cost of \$2,500.00:

7. Saskatchewan Branch was unable to undertake sponsorship but individual members have made significant contributions both to the General Fund and to the Sponsored Name Fund. Vancouver Branch pledged \$2,000.00 for the Memorial Tablet, half of which has been paid and to provide a carving of the Association Crest which has been received.

**BOOK OF REMEMBRANCE**



No estimate of costs has been arrived at but this latter item may well be a self-help project of the Association to keep costs down.

On Saturday 20th October 1990 The Right Honourable, The Countess Mountbatten of Burma, CD, JP, DL, Patron of the PPCLI Association and Colonel in Chief Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry unveiled the Memorial Tablet to officially open the PPCLI Memorial Hall of Honour.

Over two hundred guests attended the ceremony including the newly appointed Colonel of the Regiment Major General H.C. Pitts, MC, CD and Mrs. Pitts and the former Colonel of the Regiment Brigadier General R.S. Graham, and Mrs. Graham. Also attending were Vice-Patrons of the Association Major General G.G. Brown, OStJ, CD, and Mrs. Brown and Colonel W.B.S. Sutherland, CD, and Mrs. Sutherland of Ottawa. Other distinguished guests included Senator S.C. Waters, CD, and Mrs. Waters and Mr. Neil Stewart, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Calgary Military Museum Society and Mrs. Stewart. The PPCLI Association was well represented by the members of the Calgary Branch who hosted the event as well as Edmonton Branch President Tex McCannel and Mrs. McCannel, Ron King, Edmonton Branch Secretary and Okanagan/Thompson Branch President Tom Tyson and Mrs. Tyson.

National President W.E. Harrington, MC, CD, of Vancouver accompanied by Calgary Branch President John Hodge, CD, met the Colonel of the Regiment and the Patron in the courtyard of the Museum of The Regiments to escort them in turn to the Memorial Hall of Honour. With the impressive facade of the Museum in the background and the Eternal Flame burning, the entrance, flanked by two scarlet clad members of the Corps of Drums provided by First Battalion of the Regiment, made a striking setting for the arrival of guests.

In his introductory remarks, President Harrington paid tribute to the late National President Colonel L.W. Basham, CD, for his dedicated work for the Association during his short tenure in office. He also congratulated Brigadier General Graham for his support of the Association's Hall of Honour project and Rod Middleton, former National President for his untiring efforts in seeing the project through from its conception to its completion. President Harrington then turned the ceremony over to Rod, who in his remarks paid tribute to those Patricias who had paid the supreme sacrifice in WW I, WW II, Korea and on United Nations Operations.

The names of 1784 Patricias are carried on 24 granite panels that comprise the Memorial. The original oil painting of



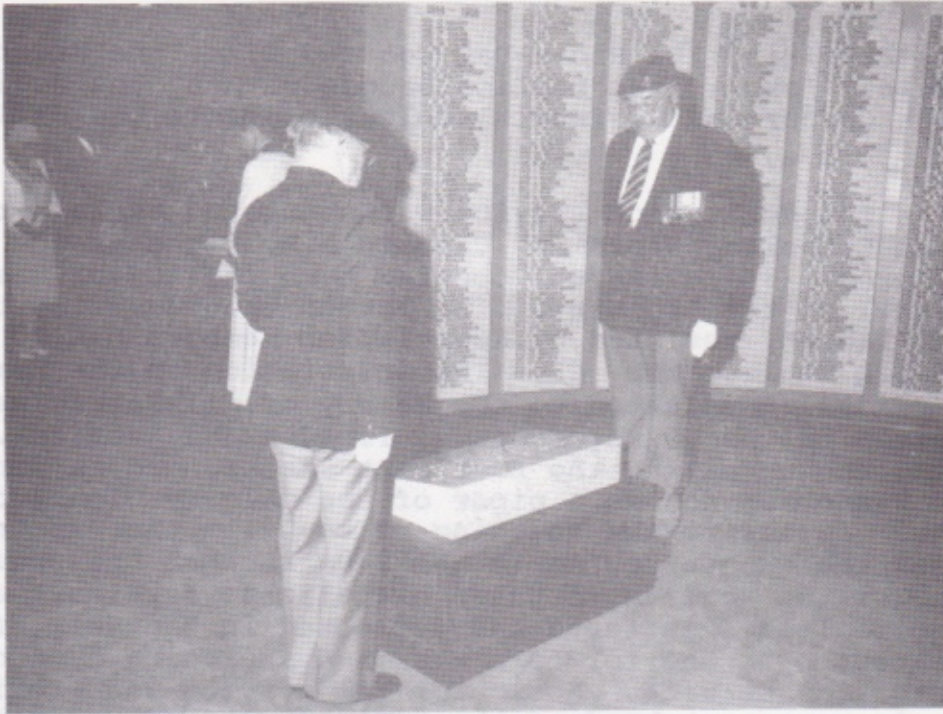
Princess Patricia, the Ric-a-Dam-Doo and Pike, the Wreath of Immortelles, large sized replica badges worn by the Regiment and a Queen's Colour and Regimental Colour complete the Hall of Honour.

The dedication service was conducted by the Protestant and Roman Catholic chaplains, Captain J.M. Fletcher and Captain J.C. Gingras. Following the opening hymn the lesson was read by the Colonel of the Regiment. The Patron then unveiled the Memorial Tablet, assisted by Association members B.A.J. Franklin, CD, and L.A. White, MMM, CD. The inscription on the Memorial Tablet reads: "Dedicated to the Memory of all Patricias who gave their lives in the cause of peace, freedom and justice". Following the unveiling the Last Post was sounded, a minute of silence was observed and a piper of the Calgary Highlanders piped a lament. following the sounding of reveille the Patron addressed the guests noting in her remarks that the present strength of the Regiment's three battalions was almost equal to the wartime losses suffered and reflected in the Hall of Honour. The recitation of the Lord's prayer and a closing hymn completed the dedication service. Music for the service was provided by the 22 piece concert band of the Regimental Band under the direction of Captain D. Jones, CD.

Calgary Branch President then invited guests to a reception in the museum foyer hosted by members of the local branch.

1.1.	<u>CALL TO ORDER</u>	
1.1.2	The 42nd Meeting of the PPCLI Association was called to order at 0835 hrs by the President. He welcomed all to the meeting and then asked for the members to rise and observe a minute of silence for departed comrades since the last meeting.	
2.1	<u>QUORUM</u>	
2.1.2	The President asked the Secretary-Treasurer to announce the numbers of members present and the numbers of proxies received. The Secretary-Treasurer announced that 38 members were present and the 220 proxies had been received for a total of 258 votes. The President announced that the figures exceed the numbers required and that the meeting is legally constituted in accordance with the By-Law Three, Section 2, Article 3.07.	
3.1	<u>APPROVAL OF AGENDA</u>	
3.1.2	The President announced that the Agenda had been circulated and copies had also been distributed. The President asked that a new item be added under "Other Business". He stated that the new item should read "Amendment to By-Laws". He then asked for further additions or deletions. There were none.	
	<u>Motion:</u> Moved by T. Tyson, seconded by S. Weeks that the Agenda be approved as amended.

4.1	<u>MINUTES OF THE 41ST ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING</u>	
4.1.2	The President stated that the Minutes had been circulated in the Newsletter dated 31 October, 1989. He asked of there were any errors or omissions. There were none noted.	

Motion: Moved by N. McCowan, seconded by L. Jones, that the minutes of August 12, 1989, be approved as circulated.

CARRIED

5.1 REPORTS

5.1.2 The President commenced by asking that before proceeding to the business at hand, he be permitted to read three messages sent out on behalf of the association. These messages were sent to the UK Branch on the occasion of their Frezenberg dinner 9 May 1990, to the Kelowna-Okanagan Branch for Lady Patricia on the occasion of a dinner held in her honour, 24 May 1990, and a message sent to the WOs and Senior NCOs Club on the occasion of their annual gathering of 19 May 1990.

5.1.3 The President continued by reporting that the year 1989/90 was reasonably busy and that he had convened two meetings of the Board of Trustees of the Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund (HGFMF) and attended two meetings of the Regimental Guard. He stated that he would report on the activities as follows:

- a. meetings of the Board of Trustees and Regimental Guard of 21 October, 1989, at Calgary;
- b. meetings of the Board of Trustees and Regimental Guard of 20 April 1990 at Calgary; and
- c. Report on the third Annual Meeting of the Association Council of 25 May 1990.

5.1.4 Meeting of the Board of Trustees of 21 October 1990. The main points dealt with by resolution were:

- a. to affirm the requirement to meet at least once annually and to approve the Audited Financial Statement and proposed budget;
- b. to comply with the By-Law regarding signatures on cheques;
- c. the need to create a financial policy statement; and
- d. to clarify the relationship of the Regimental Executive Committee (REC) with the

Board of Trustees.

5.1.5 Meeting of the Regimental Guard 21 October 1989. Three Association matters were dealt with at this meeting:

- a. the current status on the Hall of Honour Project was presented by R. Middleton;
- b. the President raised the matter of a conflict by a proposal made to the Guard to establish a Heritage Committee, when provision already existed in the By-Laws for a Museum Committee with the same functions. The President was requested to prepare an option to harmonize the proposal with the existing By-Laws; and
- c. it was agreed that no person should be appointed a member of the Regimental Senate unless he was also a member of the Association.

5.1.6 Meeting of the Board of Trustees of 20 April 1990. The President reported that items dealt with were as follows:

- a. a resolution was approved nominating the Museum Committee members and terms of reference for this Committee;
- b. a financial policy statement was approved which would be reviewed annually; and
- c. the budget in 1991 was approved.

5.1.7 Meeting of the Regimental Guard 20 April 1990. The President reported that at the time of this General Meeting the Minutes of the Regimental Guard Meeting of 20 April, 1990, had not been received. However, three items, affecting the Association, were raised and considered, they were:

- a. a further update report on the Hall of Honour Project by R. Middleton;
- b. presentation of the President's option for the Heritage proposal, approved earlier in the day by the Board of Trustees of the HGMF; and

- c. presentation of a paper on the President's views of the irregular administration of the PPCLI Association Regimental Fund; the Guard recommended negotiation with the REC to provide an option of administering this fund in compliance with the By-Laws, but at the same time meeting the requirements of the REC.

5.1.8 Presidents' Report on the Council Meeting of 25 May 1990 at Kapyong Barracks. The President stated he was pleased to report that a successful Council Meeting was held on the previous day, the 25th of May 1990. The Council considered the following salient items:

- a. received confirmation that last year's amendments to the By-Laws were approved by the Minister of Corporate Affairs Canada and were now effective;
- b. that 5,000 copies of the new Association Brochure had been printed and were distributed or were being distributed;
- c. that an award of a Certificate of Merit and rules for the award were approved by resolution;
- d. that it was resolved that the Certificate of Appreciation would continue with new guidelines approved by Council;
- e. that council resolved not to recommend to the Guard a Regimental Day Celebrating a World War II action. (a resolution exists in the books of the Association, that Branches may celebrate the Hitler Line or any other World War II Battle if they so desire);
- f. That council approves and recommends an amendment to By-Law Article 4.15 nominations, to be dealt with later in this meeting;
- g. approved the nomination of the Chairman of the following standing committees:

Finance:	President
Membership:	J. Hodge
Research/Editorial:	W.E. Harrington;

- h. approved a draft resolution authorizing and

regulating the PPCLI Association Regimental Fund as a basis if negotiation with the REC;

j. a general consensus was reached that newsletters should be exchanged between Branches where possible;

k. a resolution was considered on a more stringent application of the By-Laws on the receipt of dues and membership rolls from Branches, but a consensus was reached that all Branches should make every effort to comply with the By-Law; and

m. Council agreed on the site and date of the next Annual General Meeting which will be raised later in this meeting.

5.1.9 The President concluded by thanking the Secretary-Treasurer for his untiring efforts on behalf of the Association, the Past President for his sterling work on the Hall of Honour, Larry Harrington for his work as Vice President. He then expressed his thanks and appreciation on behalf of the Association of the Manitoba/N.W. Ontario Branch for hosting this meeting. "So far a job well done". He then asked for a motion to receive his report.

Motion: Moved by L. Jones, seconded by T. Tyson, that the President's Report be received.

**CARRIED**

5.2 Secretary's Report: The Secretary-Treasurer informed the members that the current paid-up membership is at 835. He expressed his concern that members fail to inform the Secretariat when they change address which results in extra mailing costs. That Branches should provide nominal rolls along with the fees, and that submissions for the Newsletter should be on time and in accordance with the By-Laws.

Motion: Moved by A. Kralej, Seconded by L. White, that the report by the Secretary be received.

**CARRIED**

### 5.3 PAST PRESIDENT - HALL OF HONOUR STATUS

5.3.2 R. Middleton reported that the Hall of Honour was completed but for the actual installation of the memorial



tablets. Since the installation was part of the Phase III Exhibit Plan, funding has yet to be made available by the Calgary Military Museum Society. It is understood that a fund raising campaign is about to be undertaken and it is hoped that all will be ready for a now projected opening of the Regimental areas by 11 November, 1990. However, from a Regimental view it is hoped that the Hall of Honour would be ready by mid October to have the Patron of the Association officially dedicate the Hall of Honour. Rod then explained that Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, would only officially open the Central Orientation Hall on June 30, and not, as it was widely reported, the whole of the Museum of the Regiments. He then gave a brief synopsis on the building plan itself.

5.3.3 He also reported on the status of 75th Anniversary Video sales. He stated 288 copies had been sold with the net proceeds going to the Hall of Honour project. To date \$45,687 had been collected for a total project bill of \$68,000.00 already paid and subsidized by the Regiment. The outstanding pledges amount to \$12,620.00. The Branches who have yet to meet their pledges were the Edmonton Branch (\$2,300.00) the SW Ontario Branch (\$2,500.00) and the Atlantic Branch (\$1,000.00). The Saskatchewan Branch was unable to meet its pledge, but individuals of that Branch had made substantial donations. Units of the Regiment have also made some contribution and he expected two substantial donations yet to come from 2nd Battalion and the Battle School. He then expressed hope that the total of \$68,000.00 would be raised during the next 12 months. He stressed that the project would be ongoing and urged all present to do their utmost with their Branches to support the project. He informed the members that all donations were tax-receipted and urged Branches who are receiving individual donations to submit these individual cheques, along with a nominal roll, so that a tax receipt could be issued to the individuals concerned. He concluded his report by saying that he is optimistic about the project and confident that the Association would be able to meet its obligation.

5.4 The President thanked Rod Middleton for his excellent work, and comments. Opened the floor for any questions or comments on the report.

## 5.5 FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

5.5.2 Association Operating Fund: The Secretary-Treasurer presented the Audited Statement. He

explained the elements of the Balance Sheet and the Statement of Earnings/Expenditure. (Annex "A")

Motion: Moved by J. Hayward, seconded by A. Kralej, that the audited Statement of the Association Operating Fund be approved.

Discussion: The Secretary-Treasurer informed the members that an appraisal had been done in 1989 and that the figures had been passed to the auditors, Coopers & Lybrand. He was unable to explain the omission of the current figures. He added that he would contact the account supervisor of Coopers & Lybrand to find the answer. This was found satisfactory.

#### CARRIED

Secretarial Note: From Coopers & Lybrand: "The reason the 1989 figures were not included in the 1989 audited statement is that the submitted museum property register was not complete, therefore according to the rules of the Society of Chartered Accountants, the old figures had to be used". Every effort will be made to ensure that at end 1990 the correct figures will be available and completely verified.

5.5.3 Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund: The Secretary-Treasurer presented the audited statements for the Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund. There were no questions. (Annex "B")

Motion: Moved by L. White, Calgary, seconded by T. Tyson, Okanagan, that the audited financial statement for the Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund be approved as presented.

5.5.4 PPCLI Association Fund Balance Sheet, 30 April 90: The Secretary-Treasurer presented the balance sheet of the Association Operating Fund, as of 30 April 90. (Annex "C")

#### 5.6 1991 BUDGETS

5.6.1 Association Operation Fund: The Secretary-Treasurer presented the 1991 Budget. (Annex "D")

Motion: Moved by R. Rochon, Winnipeg, seconded by J. Hayward, Regina, that the 1991 Budget for the Association Operating Fund be approved.

5.6.2 Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund: The Secretary-Treasurer presented the 1991 Budget. There were no questions. (Annex "E")

Motion: Moved by L. Jones, Regina, seconded by E. Hynes, Winnipeg, that the 1991 Budget for the Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund be approved as presented.

Since some government agencies require financial statements audited by chartered accounting firms, especially leading up to and including the 75th Anniversary, it would behoove the Association to remain with the present firm of Coopers & Lybrand and re-examine the issue in 1991.
