

FROM THE COLONEL OF THE REGIMENT

Having attended the Annual General Meeting in Chilliwack – so ably hosted by the Fraser Valley Branch – I am more impressed than ever with the tremendous progress made by the Association in its assistance and support to the retired and serving components of the Regiment.

 sharing comparable and compatible purposes and objects;
- Regimental Heritage. This program will include support to the Regimental Museum and Memorial
 maintenance in order to foster and maintain the spirit of the Regiment, promote public awareness
 and perpetuate understanding of the Regiment, its heritage and tradition of Service to the Nation
 and to Communities and stimulate public support for the Regiment;
- Bursaries. This will continue as a stand-alone program to provide educational bursaries to selected deserving persons; and
- Cadet Support. This program will formalize the Association's support to PPCLI affiliated Cadet
 Corps This program will include the administration of the PPCLI Association Cadet Corps Trophy
 competition and ensuring that limited financial support is directed to the Cadet Corps most in
 need. As a note, congratulations to the 2254 Calgary cadet corps for winning this completion
 for the second time in a row.

I look forward to the next few years as we face new challenges and successes.





President - Michael (Mike) Austdal, CD



Mike Austdal began his career in 1973, studying at College Militaire Royal de St. Jean. He earned his Bachelor degree and joined 1 PPCLI in Calgary in 1978 as a platoon commander.

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From 1978 until 1982 he served with the 1 PPCLI as a platoon commander, armoured defence platoon commander, company 2 i/c and for a short but memorable time as company commander.

During subsequent command tours, he served as DCO 2 Commando, Delta Company Commander 2 PPCLI, CO 2 Commando, DCO 1 PPCLI, Sector Commander in Rwanda and CO PPCLI Battle School. In addition he was a NATO planner for the Balkans for SACEUR in the late nineties. He completed his 30 years of service with a tour at NDHQ on the NATO desk.

After retiring in 2003, he became a chef at the Cordon Bleu school of cooking and a sommelier through Algonquin College. In 2005 he accepted a job with Cubic as Senior Analyst in Wainwright, AB and continues fulltime employment supporting the Canadian Army readiness using live simulation. He recently stood down as the Secretary for the Association and was the lead for construction of Patricia Park in Edmonton. He is also President of the Wainwright branch of the Association. Matt Brown began his military career with a reserve unit, the Essex & Kent Scottish in Windsor Ontario. After four years he enlisted in the regular force, completing his depot training with the PPCLI in Edmonton and Wainwright. During his years with 1PPCLI and 2PPCLI he served in Edmonton, West Germany, Cyprus and Winnipeg. He also participated in operations in Quebec during the FLQ Crisis.

Dougal (Doug) Salmon, CD





After Infantry training, he was posted to 2 PPCLI in Winnipeg. In 1973 he was selected for commissioning and was posted to 3 PPCLI Victoria upon completion of Officer training. He completed a tour in Cyprus with 3 PPCLI and was subsequently posted to Germany with 3 Mechanized Commando in 1976. Geo-Memorials

Three lakes in northern Saskatchewan have been named after soldiers from the Royal Canadian Horse Artillery and Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry who died in Afghanistan. The geo-memorial recognizes the sacrifices of individuals who were born or spent time in Saskatchewan and who gave their lives in service.

Goddard Lake has been named after Capt. Nichola Goddard, who died in a firefight in May 2006.

Anderson Lake recognizes Cpl. Jordan Anderson, who was killed by an improvised explosive device while he was on patrol in the Panjwaii district in July 2007.

Greff Lake bears the name of Master Cpl. Byron Greff, who was killed in Kabul in October 2011 when the armoured bus he was in was rammed by a car packed with explosives.

Final Centennial Events

The centennial year events program ended with the Returns tours' which visited locations and people of significant importance to the regimental family. The returns tours included a week in the UK and a week in Belgium/France. The following articles report and summarize these visits.

Private Returns Tour UK Week 29 April - 6 May 2015

The first week of the Private Returns Tour to the United Kingdom got off to a very good start when the majority of us met at Pearson International Airport on Wednesday, 29 April. There were a total of 28 individuals who signed up for the week. The majority were directly connected to the Regiment; however, there were four individuals who wanted to learn about the Regiment and its history. Everyone quickly bonded and soon we were on the flight from Toronto to London. We landed in London on the 30th, at about 9 am on Day 2 and then had a busy day with a visit to the Tower of London. We finally arrived at the hotel just after 5 pm. The meet & greet was a little subdued since we were suffering from jetlag.

Day 3 (Friday, 1 May) was busy with a whirlwind bus tour of London, lunch at the London Club and a tour of the Imperial War Museum.

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Day 4 (Saturday, 2 May) started off with a private tour of Westminster Abbey where we were met by the Very Reverend John Hall, Dean of Westminster Abbey. Having a private tour of the Abbey was incredible. In the afternoon we had tea with Lady Patricia at Canada House. Lady Patricia was in outstanding form and privately chatted with everyone on the tour. We owe a special thanks to BGen Matthew Overton for organizing the tea and allowing us to use Canada House. It was very moving when the Private Returns "Choir" broke into a chorus of "Has Anyone See the Colonel" upon Lady Patricia's departure.

Day 5 (Sunday, 3 May) was another outstanding day. The tour group was granted the privilege of visiting the Royal Burial Grounds at Frogmore by her Majesty the Queen. We had a private tour of Frogmore House where Lady Patricia's father, Lord Mountbatten, was born. We then visited the Royal Burial Grounds passing by Queen Victoria's Mausoleum before we held a short service at Princess Patricia's grave. We then carried on to Brookwood Cemetery where 22 Patricias are buried. The day ended with our arrival in Winchester.

Day 6 was spent touring the Rifles Museum where we also had an excellent presentation on how the Rifles RHQ is organized. The Rifles RHQ is quite different from ours in that it is staffed by civil servants (mainly retired military) who provide outstanding support to the serving component, the wounded, families of the fallen and retired members. In fact, they even assist with recruiting officers for the Rifle Battalions. To be honest, our system could learn a bit from them. The tour of Morin Hill and surrounding training area where the Regiment was integrated into the 80th Brigade and completed its final training just prior to deployment to France and Flanders was historic. Our tour guide, David Key provided us with an outstanding overview of the difficult conditions faced by all due to constant rain and lack of infrastructure at the Camp. There were numerous individuals who stated in their memoirs that the conditions at the Morin Hill were as bad if not worse than the mud they experienced in Flanders.

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Day 7 (Tuesday, 5 May) involved a bus trip to Hatch Beaumont where we were hosted by John Townson, Godson of Hammie Gault, and his sister Jane (Townson) Ogers. We conducted a service at the Hatch Beaumont Church in honour of Hammie Gault and his wife Dorothy. The address by MGen (Ret'd) Bob Stewart in honour of Hammie was heartfelt and provided everyone with an excellent overview of our Founder and what he accomplished during his life and service to both Canada and the United Kingdom. Hammie was a man of many talents and a true leader.

After the Church service, we toured a portion of Hatch Court and the museum which commemorates the founding of the Regiment and the lives of Hamilton and Dorothy Gault. We were then hosted to an excellent luncheon by John and Jane Townson. At the end of the luncheon, Ray Romses presented the Townsons with a couple of bottles of Regimental Wine as a token of our appreciation.

We then returned to Winchester and packed our bags so that we would be ready to travel to Ipers on May 6th, where we would link up with 52 others for part two of the Private Returns Tour.

In summary, it was a very busy and informative six days during which we retraced a small portion of the ground covered by the Originals prior to their deployment to France as part of 80th Brigade. The opportunity to visit both Princess Patricia's and Hamilton Gault's graves was incredible. To have tea with Lady Patricia at Canada House was outstanding. In fact, every portion of the visit was memorable. All of this would not have been possible without the hard work and dedication of Ray Paquin and Vince and Wendy Kennedy. The time, effort and attention to detail that they put into organizing the first week of the Private Returns Tour was obvious and greatly appreciated by all.

52 individuals left Canada on Monday, 4 May for the last part of the Private returns tour. I cannot comment on what fun and sights they saw in Paris, since I was still in the United Kingdom. However on Wednesday, 6 May, 28 of us from the UK portion of the tour joined forces with everyone at the Novotel in leper, Belgium. In many ways it was a smaller 100th Anniversary reunion. We quickly took over the bar and had a great Meet and Greet.

Thursday, 7 May started off with a quick breakfast and then a historical scene setting brief on World War One by Doug Delaney and Terry Loveridge. Doug and Terry would be our Battlefield historians for the next six days. The briefings were very well done and we soon headed off to visit St Julien, Passchendaele, the Brooding Soldier, Tyne Cot and Voormezele Cemetery Enclosure No. 3 where LCols Farquhar, Buller and a number of other Patricias are buried.

The evening was free and many headed off to Menin Gate and the numerous other evening attractions within leper.

Friday, 8 May was the signature day of the tour. We started very early with a private Regimental service at Voormezele Cemetery Enclosure No. 3. The Memorial Baton Relay departed the cemetery for Bellewarde Woods while we attended breakfast at the Zonnebeck Community Centre. During breakfast there was an excellent lecture by Carl Kletke and presentation of the Regimental War Diary from the Battle of Frezenberg by an officer in period uniform. We them moved by bus to the Frezenberg battle area, and walked the front lines of the PPCLI positions to the Frezenberg Memorial. The rededication of the Memorial was outstanding.

As the 2PPCLI guard marched on parade all the spectators started to sing the Regimental March Past. The service was extremely well done and involved the arrival of the Memorial Baton as they completed the last leg of a relay that started in Edmonton on 10 August 2014. The 100th Anniversary Memorial plaque was unveiled by Madame Adrienne, LGen Crabbe (COR), MGen Day (Senior Serving Patricia) and David Pentney (Association Past President).

Their 7 minute show was impressive; a video has been uploaded to Facebook. The day finished off with 2 PPCLI augmenting the Menin Gate service. Of special note were the Patricia cadets who were front and centre and also laid a wreath that evening. It was a historic day.

We visited Mount St Eloi, four different cemeteries including the German Cemetery at Neuville-St-Vaast where 44,000 soldiers are buried. The tour of Vimy Ridge was excellent, in particular the tunnels. What can you say when you stand in what was the Battalion Command Post and think about the orders that Agar Adamson gave just before the Regiment participated in the capture of Vimy Ridge? The afternoon finished with a service on Vimy Ridge and group photographs of everyone who participated in the final portion of the 100th Anniversary celebrations.

Monday, 11 May was our last day of Battlefield tours. In eight hours we covered the same ground that the Regiment did during the last 100 days of World War One. Of course we had the advantage that we were on a bus when they had to fight their way across the ground and were on foot. We visited Canal du Nord, Cambrai, Valenciennes and finally ended our day at Mons. Again, there were so many things that we saw that you cannot do justice to them in this short article.

On Tuesday, 12 May the Private Returns Tour was officially over and we headed off in multiple directions. Some straight back to Canada and some stayed in Europe for a few extra days. The friendships that we renewed and the history we covered over the past week was incredible. Many people made the trip a great success, in particular Doug Delaney and Terry Loveridge who provided the background of the various battles. It was easy to imagine the hardships and terror that was faced by many as we listened to both Doug and Terry. They made the battles come alive and gave us all a much better understanding of the challenges that all soldiers faced during World War One.

A letter from a PPCLI Cadet participant in the Battlefield Tour following his return to Canada.

Dear Mr. Poitras

Imagine being the age of 16, boarding a train or a ship on which you have never been on. All that you have is a small bag with your possessions. Once you arrive, you are told that you have 6 months of training before heading over to Europe to fight a war with people whom you don't even know. This was the story of many young boys from across Canada during the First World War.

For me, writing this in the 21st century. I had a very similar experience to those who fought in the First World War. I was one of only a few cadets selected to partake in a trip to the old world. My regiment, the P.P.C.L.I turned 100 in 2015 and this was my reasoning for this trip. Today there is no war in Western Europe however while enroute for this trip, I did feel similar emotions to those that may have fought in the so called "Great War". While travelling I felt a sense of both confusion and seclusion. Even though I am eighteen, I cannot imagine how lost some of the soldiers felt while boarding their trains. For the majority of the time, they did not even know where they were going, luckily I did manage to find my group and we successfully arrived in Europe on May 5, 2015.

From this point we embarked on the trip of a life time in the countries of both France and Belgium. Throughout the course of the 9 day trip, we would visit many places of significance in the events of the First World War..

Our visit to Paris was exactly as I expected. We visited sights which I had only heard or seen pictures of. The part of the trip which really stood out however was our time spent in the Ypres area. This small Belgian town was certainly a place of significance throughout the First World War. The town was host to one of the first gas attacks and in fact all of Belgium was basically a buffer against the Germans during the war.

Today the town has rebuilt over the course of the past 100 years. While there, I was given the ability to partake in the Menin Gate service, a service which has taken place every night since 1929. It is done to remember the fallen of both past and present. Laying a wreath whilst bagpipes played was even more haunting than I would have expected.

This trip certainly brought the events of the First World War to life as I imagine it did for others on the trip. Particularly touching was seeing the veterans, many of whom had parents of grandparents which fought in the war. For many of the veterans, I feel as if their connection to the war was even more prevalent.

The cemeteries which we visited, several on each day, were a reminder to the substantial amount of loss on both sides during the First World War. The losses of the First World War are so much greater than those of any modern war. The combination of old style tactics and a massive war machine proved to be devastating during this war. In the First World War, boys were literally sent over the trenches to die within seconds.

In conclusion I cannot state enough how valuable this trip was. The things which I learned and that which I saw will certainly stick with me for the rest of my life. I would like to thank both you and those behind the curtains who helped me attend this trip. The cadet program has allowed me to achieve so much and this trip is certainly a highlight of my cadet career.

As the Association continues to finalize the end of year reports on the events and costs. The fo9llowing report highlight what was accomplished by our members' organizing and completing the Frezenberg Memorial.

100th Anniversary Frezenberg Memorial - A Four Year Refurbishment Process

The Concept: The Atlantic Branch of the PPCLI Association with the lead of Dave Snowball and assisted by Bill Minnis commenced a dialogue with the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) in the fall 2011 to enter into an agreement that resulted in their organization in essence act as our Project Manager on the ground in Belgium for a fixed fee.

The first step in developing a supporting plan to effect a concept of what was achievable was the definition of the Legal Geometer which was provided be the Commonwealth War Graves Commission (CWGC) in May 2011. This document was forwarded to RHQ (PPCLI) for safe keeping as we could not find one in our records.

Unfortunately, the untimely passing of David Snowball in late December 2011 resulted in Bill Minnis taking on the lead in January 2012. Bill Minnis aided by Major Kris Callaert and Dave Pentney put a set of sketches together during the period March to the end April 2012 that resulted in an approval of the concept of design by end of August 2012. The cost estimate and design less bronze works were agreed and signed by the end of December. Once again a health issues to individuals resulted in Jay Lapeyre assuming the lead to monitor the completion of the Project in July 2013. The remainder of 2013 was the design of the bronze work, specifically the Marguerite Hat Badge and the 100th Anniversary Plaque were approved and completed with costing by the end of 2013. The remaining Interpretive Plaque was designed and approved from the period March to end 2014. The contribution of Dr Doug Deleney (accurate historical representation) and Paul Hale (supervisor, manager and point of contact) were instrumental in achieving a first class result in the finished product.

<u>CWGC</u>: The supervisor Richard Saynor and Tony Edwards (Works Supervisor) were extremely effective in maintaining contact and passing timely reports so that we could maintain effective information passage to gain timely approvals at every level. They were officially recognized for their extra work on our behalf.

Costing: The Budget for this Project was set at \$75K.



70th Anniversary of the Liberation of the Netherlands

Four veteran Patricia's were nominated by the PPCLI Regimental Association to participate in the 70th anniversary of the liberation of the Netherlands in May 2015. Charles "Chic" Goodman, George Wilkinson, Lloyd Swick and Doug Armstrong are all World War II veterans who were involved in the campaign to push the Germans out of occupied Holland in 1944-45.

This article provides an account of their journey back to the Netherlands which they helped free 70 years ago



this month. More than 7,600 Canadians gave their lives in the liberation of this country and honouring their sacrifice and the service of those remaining vets was the prime motivation behind this trip. A special bond exists between the Dutch people and Canadians because of our help in their liberation, and this was very evident by the warm welcome we received. Many of the towns they visited had Canadian flags hanging from windows and roof tops. The official Canadian delegation contained 60 vets and an equal number of caregivers. The vets ranged in age from the youngest at 88 to George Wilkinson at 97.

The veterans were accompanied on their flight to Holland by Mrs. Harper. They first traveled to Groesbeek Cemetery for a Remembrance Ceremony sponsored by the government of Canada. There are 2,330 Canadians buried here. Mrs. Harper spoke about the special relationship between Canada and the Netherlands.

They next attended a Commerative Ceremony sponsored by "Welcome Again Veterans" (a Dutch group) at Holten Canadian War Cemetery, where 1,393 soldiers are buried. As we drove through the village, signs proclaimed "Welcome Veterans". Prime Minister Harper and King Willem-Alexander spoke. A poem by Holten school children "The Train Whistle" was read by three children. A Spitfire flew over after our moment of silence

and then a helicopter flew low and dropped red poppies over the crowd. The Victoria Children's' Choir sang and bands played. The theme of the ceremony was for the Holten school children who adopt a grave and come to the cemetery during the year for special ceremonies. A memorable speech was given "to the children", which had been translated and handed out as we entered. At the end of the speech, the children were reminded to stop in front of a grave, read the name and to stand quietly and to think of the sacrifice made by that young soldier. Then each class went to a designated section and placed a bouquet of yellow roses in front of each headstone. It was very emotional watching the children and thinking of the commitment of the Dutch people to keep this tradition



going for 70 years. After the ceremony the veterans went to Woody's Restaurant where the Prime Minister, Mrs. Harper and the dignitaries were waiting to greet each of us in a receiving line. As we drove away, after lunch, the entire restaurant staff stood outside to wave good-by.

Chic Goodman was invited to go to Westerbork Kamp (his unit, the South Saskatchewan Regiment, liberated the camp) and to be on a panel with Mrs. Harper, Minister O'Toole and two survivors.

We were met by the Director of the Museum, Derrick Mulder, his assistant Wendy and the two survivors. There



were also Canadian Cadets and high school students present. Westerbork was the site of a large transit and work camp. Over 100,000 Jews, gypsies and resistance members were taken to Westerbork. Beginning July 12, 1942, trains left the camp for Auschwitz and other death camps. Westerbork was liberated by the South Saskatchewan Regiment on April 12, 1945, and 876 prisoners were set free.

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Also on 5 May there was a Wageningen Liberation Parade Wageningen is famous as the city where the German forces in the Netherlands formerly surrendered to the commander of the 1st Canadian Corps, Lieutenant-General Charles Foulkes on May 5, 1945. Exactly 70 years later we arrived in the city to

find it filled with restored military vehicles, serving soldiers, cadets, thousands of parade watchers, marching bands and of course, veterans from several countries. Each veteran was provided with a colour coded card which told them which vehicle they would be riding in. George Wilkinson is in the vehicle on the far right in this picture

On 8 may the veterans traveled by bus to the Reichswald Forest Commonwealth Cemetery, located just inside the German border near the town of Kleve. A total of 7, 594 Commonwealth servicemen are buried or commemorated in this quiet, tree-fringed cemetery. More than 700 Canadians, mostly airmen, rest here. The ceremony we attended here was a private one, with no members of the public present.

Every five years since 1985 a National Street Parade and Liberation Festival has occurred in Apeldoorn. The parade is led by Canadian veterans in military vehicles interspersed with marching bands. George Wilkinson found himself in another army vehicle together with his old buddy Bill Stoker, the youngest member of our delegation at 88. They hadn't seen each other before this trip for some 40 years. As the parade wound through the streets of Apeldoorn they were again met by large crowds of flag waving people, young and old.

The veterans found this a very rewarding and memorable trip and are very grateful to Veterans Affairs who organized the trip with special care in




mind for the elderly veterans, some of whom were confined to wheelchairs. The sight of thousands of appreciative Dutch people and others who lined the parade routes or who greeted us individually and shook the hands of the veterans was an overwhelming experience. Guests of honour included: Scott Moir, Olympic gold medalist; Paul Franklin, Amputee Coalition of Canada; Kaitlyn Lawes; Lewis Mackenzie; Dennis Moore (Korean veteran); and Johnny Bower, a WW II veteran. Joining in were Hockey Hall of Famers and four Stanley Cup winners.

The net proceeds from the game will be spit 50-50 with Wounded Warriors Canada (WWC). Trustee Dave Fraser was the resident Foundation member who worked with HHC Founder Glenn Cumyn, and our partner Scott Maxwell of WWC. Kent Foster served as Foundation chair.

Frezenberg Youth Education Program Sends 11 Cadets

Funds were raised by the PPCLI Foundation to send 11 Canadian Army cadets and two leaders to the recent Frezenberg Commemoration events. They participated, along with Patricias, in the dedication of a renovated memorial to the memory of those who paid the supreme sacrifice 100 years ago. The cadets were selected from across Canada and participated in battlefield tours. As well, volunteer historians Terry Loveridge and Douglas Delaney from Kingston, ON were on hand to illuminate the events of 1915, the sacrifice and the broad context of World War I.

Trustees Elected for 2015-2018 Term

At the 2015 Annual General Meeting held in Chilliwack, BC on April 17, 2015, four Trustees who were first elected in 2011 were re-elected for another three-year term. Dennis Anderson, Phillip Crawley, Marilyn Elliott (Treasurer) and Kent Foster (President) were elected Trustees for 2015-2018.

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Association through the Hamilton Gault Memorial Fund.

Beyond the services and financial support we raised from industry and individuals for the 100th Anniversary, the Foundation raised some \$300,000 from public and private grants and contribution programs. In-kind contributions are not included in the financial statements but are an important component of the support generated by the Foundation. We are grateful to all of these contributors for their generosity.

Family of Late Dr. Shaun Brown Donates Extensive Collection to PPCLI Regimental Library

Marilyn Elliott, Foundation Treasurer, and her family donated to the PPCLI Regimental Library an extensive collection of books held by her late husband, Dr. Shaun Brown (son of former Colonel of the Regiment, George Brown). Dr. Brown, who had a PhD in military history, had amassed a large collection of historical books from his studies and teaching.

The military books were donated to the Library by the three children of Marilyn and Shaun with the hope that these books will bring reading pleasure to Patricias for many years to come.

Special Events on the Horizon

Looking to the future, special events on the horizon include: the Patricia Park Personal Legacy Stone campaign; Heroes Hockey Challenge in Fall 2015, 2016 and 2017; the Summit Buller Mountain climb; gala dinners such as the Battle of the Somme and Vimy Ridge; and Veterans Tribute Night. There will be a casino in late 2016 being run by the For the Soldier Institute.

An Amazing Trip to the Frezenberg Commemoration

To me, this trip to France and Belgium was the highlight of our Regiment's 100th Anniversary.

We departed Toronto airport on 3rd of May 2015 as strangers. On arrival at the Charles De Gaulle airport in Paris, we were caught by surprise, as the French army patrols moved through the airport fully armed.

On our bus tour of Paris, we stopped at the Military Hospital, where once again, the gates and grounds were manned by French Marines.

We moved by bus to leper which became our base for a few days. We were divided into two bus groups and strangers quickly became friends. Our Historians, Terry Loveridge and Doug Delaney, were a wealth of knowledge and their side bars were terrific.

Our first stop was Mount Sorrel (my recruit platoon) was quite emotional for me – almost 60 years later I was standing where the originals had fought and died for this Battle Honour. The tours of the cemeteries was very informative. To see the number of soldiers, some 15 and 16 years old, and the number of casualties from each unit buried side by side was an eye opener.

Voormezele Cemetery #3 (Our Regimental Cemetery) contained the graves of Col Farquhar and Col Buller. The early morning ceremony, with soldiers of 2PPCLI standing behind each Patricia grave was exceptional. After breakfast, our trip to the Frezenberg Memorial took place. We parked at Bellewaarde Ridge and walked to the refurbished Monument where bleachers had been set up.

Four 2PPCLI soldiers in WW1 uniforms and rifles at rest were at the Memorial. A soldier held the replica of the Ric-A-Dam-Doo beside the Monument. The Guards from 2PPCLI, with the Colours, and the Edmonton Police Pipes and Drums marched on. The Old Guard fell in after the Dedication. When Bob Stewart gave "Old Guard to the Originals Eyes Right" there was not a dry eye on Parade.

2PPCLI exercised the Freedom of the City of leper and later there was the Drumline presentation and Menin Gate service. The Menin Gate service was excellent and 2 of our cadets laid wreaths.

2PPCLI's Drumline was magnificent. When the drummers knelt down, the bass drummer placed his drum on the heels of the kneeling drummers. He lit his drum sticks on fire and preformed his routine. The routine brought the crowd to its feet.

The trip was fantastic and an eye opener for me. It brought the Originals to life rather than just figures in a book. We had excellent weather and were able to see the ground they fought on without the rain and mud. It made me wonder how a man, every day for years (if he survived), could get up and out of the trenches and advance across open ground so close to the enemy.

The trip was far too short for me, but worth every penny. At our farewell dinner, Nora Hewson and Wendy Kennedy started us singing "Has Anyone Seen the Colonel?". The cadets and student had never heard it sung and were very impressed. The cadets and the student enjoyed themselves, and learned lots about the Regiment and the suffering of the soldiers in WW1. The cadets letters to Vince Kennedy and the Foundation showed how deeply they were moved.

I would like to thank the former COR Ray Crabbe and Vice Chair Vince Kennedy for the magnificent tour which was a fitting end to the 100th Anniversary.



Long Puttees Wrapping Demonstration

At the request of the Regimental Major Slade Lerch the Victoria Branch of the PPCLI Association staged a

demonstration of how PPCLI Other Ranks wrapped their long puttees in the "reverse spiral" or "inverted V" method. The PPCLI wore long puttees during WWI and up until the start of WW II. George Wilkinson, the sole surviving member of "B" Company at Work Point Barracks from 1936 – 1939 was the demonstrator and photos and a video were produced and forwarded to Regimental HQ for their historical archive. Association members Dougal Salmon, Bruce Dickey and Jack Bates coordinated the demonstration. This unique method of wrapping long puttees was only practiced by the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry and it will now be included in the uniform dress for various historical re-enactments and museum activities


