

COLONEL-IN-CHIEF ANNUAL CHRISTMAS MESSAGE 2023

My Dear Patricias,

This is the grimmest Christmas since I became your Colonel-in-Chief in 2007. The world is at war on so many different fronts. The conflict in the Ukraine is nearly two years old. The ghastly events in Israel have been going on since October 7th. And meanwhile in the African continent, unrest and disorder go from Niger to Mali, from Sudan to Ethiopia. There is no good news anywhere.

And to make matters worse, the news of the environment is frightening. We know that our Regiment has been called upon to fight fires in the vulnerable areas of Canada. And we know that this is only the beginning. Environmental degradation is increasing exponentially. We're all certain of this. And we can make that difference and we can bring to those conflicts our Canadian values and the perspective of diversity and acceptance which we have all grown up with as Canadians. Our values are going to be more and more important as we face the world in which values are scorned and where morality and ethical standards are thrown out the window in the name of winning.

We are very fortunate that we live in a country which values democracy and the rights of individuals. We have built a strong country and we must continue to believe that our values will help us to sustain our own country. And we must always act with assurance that if we are called upon to help others, we can use our solid ideas of citizenship and belonging to help those who have not had the experience of these fundamental and sacred values.

If we are called into conflict this year, I hope we will all remember that we bring with us the best values of Canadian life - a belief in the dignity of the individual and a respect for every human being's right to life.

We want this Christmas to convey to those we love and those that we don't know who need our love, that the world can be made a better place by individual effort and by each of us caring for the most fundamental and basic values in human life.
